10:10 Ethics & Values - Preparing Young People for the Future

John 10:10 'I have come so that they may have life and have it to the full'

As a Catholic college for the community, we are committed to challenging and supporting our young people to achieve their very best and 'live life to the fullest'. (John: 10:10) We are privileged to be able to support students to develop as independent, well-rounded individuals fully prepared for life beyond Carmel. Our commitment to this preparation for the future runs throughout the additional opportunities offered to students through our varied enrichment programme and tutorial provision.



Our Year 12 students are currently exploring their next steps and being supported by curriculum and pastoral staff as well as the Careers team to make decisions about their future. The 10:10/Ethics and Values programme is a compulsory part of each student's programme of study and is focused on preparation for higher education, apprenticeships and employment whilst developing a wider knowledge of global and ethical issues. According to 'The Skills Imperative 2035: Essential Skills for Tomorrow's Workforce' (NEFR, 2023), communication, creativity and collaboration are essential skills to prepare our young people for the jobs of the future. Weekly sessions are focused on developing critical thinking and communication skills as well as encouraging students to find their voice and develop the confidence to seize opportunities in higher education and work.

Health & Wellbeing

April is Stress Awareness Month and, with Year 13 exams fast approaching, we have some advice from Young Minds on how to support our young people as they prepare for their examinations.

Firstly, it's usual to feel stressed and worried about exams. Stress is our body's natural



response to pressure. Whilst it can help us focus and feel motivated to get things done, sometimes it can feel hard to manage.

Exam stress can affect any of us in different ways. If you feel anxious, depressed, or are struggling to sleep, concentrate or have negative thoughts about yourself, you're not alone.

There are things you can do to help ease the pressure:

Be kind to yourself – think about your achievements so far and what others value about you.

Set aside time for things you enjoy.

Talk to someone – open up and talk about how you feel.

Don't compare yourself to others – try to avoid worrying about how others are revising and focus on what you can do.

Top Tips for Exam Preparation

Ask for practical help

Speak to a teacher or your Personal Achievement Tutor for support with particular topics, revision techniques or managing your revision timetable.

Check in with your friends

If your friends are studying too, they are likely to understand what you're going through. You can talk to each other about exams or take a break from studying by doing something you enjoy.

Find a study group, or start your own

You can work through problems together and help each other with different subjects. This can be a nice way to keep your social life going and boost your mood. It can also help you to see that you are not alone.

Top Tips During Exams

Get organised and don't forget the basics of self-care – prepare materials the night before, check your timetable on Cedar for times and location, plan your journey and leave plenty of time to get to college. Nourish body and mind with healthy foods, prioritise sleep and limit screen time.

Try relaxation techniques – avoid last minute cramming before the exam and focus on techniques to help you focus on remaining calm and grounded, such as, breathing exercises, taking a brisk walk or using a meditation app.

Reward yourself – give yourself something to look forward to after your exam and find time to recharge and relax.



High Achievers+ Students attend University of Cambridge North West Conference

As part of the High Achievers+ Programme, Carmel students are encouraged to apply to the most competitive universities including Oxford and Cambridge. Currently, our Year 12 students are

planning their progression pathways and, on Monday 18th March, thirty of our HA+ students who are considering an application to Oxbridge attended a conference in Haydock race course organised by five Cambridge colleges. Students were able to attend talks delivered by admissions tutors and lecturers from Cambridge. These included: making a competitive application; the student experience; interview practice and finance and careers.

Former Carmel Geographer Conducts Groundbreaking Marine Research in Antarctica

Jack McElhinney, a former Carmel Geographer, is currently conducting marine research in Antarctica. After leaving Carmel in 2012, he pursued a BSc Hons in Environmental Science at Manchester Metropolitan University, focusing on bats as indicators of ecosystem health. His interest in animal physiology led him to a summer working with a marine ecology group in Portugal and later enrolling in an MSc in Advanced Biological Sciences at the University of Liverpool.

Currently finishing his PhD at the University of Western Australia, Jack's research focuses on



the impact of warming oceans on fish populations, identifying vulnerable species and studying the link between fish size reduction and respiration. During his time in Antarctica, Jack described the unique landscape characterised by ice-covered mountains and blue icebergs. He highlighted the rapid warming in the Antarctic Peninsula, with temperatures rising by 2.8°C over the past half-century, leading to glacier retreat and changes in sea ice patterns. These changes have significant implications for the rich marine life in the region, particularly krill, a crucial species in the Antarctic food web.

Geographers Experience Icelandic Waterfalls, Volcanoes, and Coastal Landscapes

A Level Geography students embarked on an unforgettable journey to Iceland. During their visit, they witnessed the spectacle of the Reykjanes Peninsula eruption, offering a firsthand encounter with live-action Geography. Venturing further, students delved into the practical applications of Tectonic theory and Geothermic Carbon Capture at the Hellisheidi Geothermal Power Station. Additionally, they gained insight into the innovative Orca capture programme, witnessing the transformation of emission gases into rock.

Geographers also enjoyed the awe-inspiring vistas of Gullfoss Waterfall on the White River, Europe's largest waterfall.



Zofia Wins ARTiculation Prize Regional Heat

Huge congratulations to Year 13 student Zofia Kozinska for winning the regional heat of the ARTiculation Prize last week at the Whitworth Art Gallery in Manchester. Zofia, who is currently studying A Levels in Fine Art, English Literature and Spanish, represented



Carmel College, competing against nine other sixth form colleges from across the North West and Yorkshire. Priyesh Mistry, who is Associate Curator of Modern & Contemporary Projects at the National Gallery in London, was the judge on the day. He commented how amazing it was to see all of the works that the participants chose to speak about, adding that he had learnt so much. The ARTiculation Prize is an annual art history competition run by the National Gallery.



Politics Students Lead Debate at the European Youth Parliament Regional finals

A Level Politics students represented Carmel College at the regional finals of the European Youth Parliament. The European Youth Parliament is a leading non-partisan, youth-led educational

charity that provides exciting first steps to help students develop skills in debating and public speaking. Before the event, our students were invited to research and prepare material on their assigned topics on key issues affecting the UK. Students took part in a series of debates against other colleges, covering influential topics such as; combatting antisocial behaviour, climate change and the cost-of-living crisis, to a jury panel consisting of EYP members.
